IMPORTANT: Landscape Architecture consists of 4 years of sequential studio courses that are not offered in the summer, nor can you double up on them. The sequence begins in a fall semester; therefore, a LAND student will graduate no earlier than 4 years after their first fall at Texas A&M. For instance, if a student begins the studio sequence in Fall 2021, they will not graduate any earlier than Spring 2025, regardless of how many hours they transfer or how many hours they take in the summers. Students will have 4 additional years when they transfer to Texas A&M.

To qualify for automatic admission, a student must:

- Complete all courses shown in bold italics
- Complete at least 24 hours (fall/spring semesters) in residence at a single Texas A&M system institution
- Maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA at the system institution
- Maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA overall (including graded, transferable credit earned in high school)
