- Applicants must have completed MATH 140 **AND** MATH 142 (or equivalent to these courses).
- Students may have to complete College Algebra (MATH 1314) at their institution before taking MATH 1324 or 1325; however, while this is a transferable course it **will not** satisfy the mathematics requirement in this degree plan.
- A minimum of three courses (9 hours) must also be taken from the Required Coursework list: AGECE 105, ECON 202, ECON 203, ACCT 229, ACCT 230.
- **Applicants must have a minimum cumulative GPA of a 3.25 and a minimum 3.25 GPA in Priority Coursework. Priority Coursework includes all attempted courses from the "Required Coursework" category listed above (ENGL and SPCH are not included in priority coursework).**
- Repeated courses are included in all GPA calculations.
- To complete the Communication requirement, only 2 of the following courses are needed: ENGL 103, ENGL 104, COMM 203. Additional courses may be accepted in place of COMM 203; however at least three hours for this six hour communication requirement must come from either ENGL 103 or ENGL 104.
- In your essay, please be sure to address how an Agribusiness degree will help you meet your career goals. If you have 3 or more grades of D's, F's, Q's, NG's and/or W's explain why the grades occurred.

Coursework Timeline

- Competitive applicants will have all required coursework completed by the application deadline.
- Applicants to the summer/fall term that are currently enrolled in missing coursework for transfer **may** be offered the chance to submit spring final grades. This is not a guarantee.
- Summer coursework **will not** be considered for summer/fall applicants.
- Fall coursework **will not** be considered for spring applicants.
- Applicants to the spring term should have the required courses completed by the end of Summer II semester before applying.

Additional Transfer Requirements

- The Department of Agricultural Economics is looking for students who are interested in pursuing our degree as a focus. Students should indicate our department as the primary major they are interested in if they wish to be admitted. The essay and supporting materials should reflect that the student is intent on pursuing our degree.
- Meeting minimum requirements does not guarantee admission. The entire record is reviewed for consistency in coursework and grades.
- **Admission to the Agribusiness program is highly competitive. Completion of the minimum requirements does not guarantee admission. Students admitted into Agribusiness typically have an average overall and Priority Coursework GPR of 3.5 or above.**
- **If you would like to be considered for the Agriculture Economics major in the event that you are denied admission to the Agribusiness program, Agricultural Economics must be listed on your application as your second choice major.**
- We recommend meeting with an academic advisor prior to submitting the application.

Additional Information

- Applicants should be serious about earning a degree in the Department of Agricultural Economics.
- Transfer applicants are instructed NOT to accept transfer admission to any major with the expectation of later applying for an on-campus change of major.

Career & Educational Opportunities

The Bachelor of Science degree in Agribusiness combines selected Core Business Knowledge classes from a degree in Business with coursework emphasizing the understanding of the unique institutional and managerial challenges facing agribusiness firms. By integrating business management principles with applied technical knowledge, students develop practical decision-making skills to address challenges facing agribusiness firms in the production, processing and distribution of food and fiber in Texas, the nation, and the world. Students are prepared to work in both traditional agribusinesses and non-agricultural companies.
