- Applicants must have completed MATH 140 AND MATH 142 (or equivalent to these courses).
- Students may have to complete College Algebra (MATH 1314) at their institution before taking MATH 1324 or 1325; however, while this is a transferable course it **will not** satisfy the mathematics requirement in this degree plan.
- A minimum of three courses (9 hours) must also be taken from the Required Coursework list: AGEC 105, ECON 202, ECON 203, ACCT 229, ACCT 230.
- Applicants must have a minimum cumulative GPA of a 2.75 and a minimum 2.75 GPA in Priority Coursework. Priority Coursework includes: MATH 140, MATH 142, ECON 202, ECON 203, ACCT 229, ACCT 230, AGEC 105 (or their equivalents).
- Repeated courses are included in all GPA calculations.
- To complete the Communication requirement, 2 of the following courses are needed: ENGL 103, ENGL 104, COMM 203. Additional courses may be accepted in place of COMM 203; however at least three hours for this six hour communication requirement must come from either ENGL 103 or ENGL 104.
- In your essay, please be sure to address how an Agricultural Economics degree will help you meet your career goals. If you have 3 or more grades of D's, F's, Q's, NG's and/or W's explain why the grades occurred.

Coursework Timeline

- Applicants must have all required coursework completed by the application deadline.
- Fall coursework is not considered for spring applicants, summer/spring coursework is not considered for summer/fall applicants.

Additional Transfer Requirements

- The Department of Agricultural Economics is looking for students who are interested in pursuing our degree as a focus. Students should indicate our department as the primary major they are interested in if they wish to be admitted. The essay and supporting materials should reflect that the student is interested in pursuing our degree.
- Admission to the Agricultural Economics program is competitive. Completion of the minimum requirements does not guarantee admission. The entire record is reviewed for consistency in coursework and grades.

Additional Information

- Applicants should be serious about earning a degree in Department of Agricultural Economics.
- Transfer applicants are instructed NOT to accept transfer admission to any major with the expectation of later applying for an on-campus change of major.
- We recommend meeting with an academic advisor prior to submitting the application.

Career & Educational Opportunities

The globalization of agriculture, new technologies, nutritional and environmental consciousness, and U.S. and foreign policies are creating the need for industries to hire graduates with strong backgrounds in applied economics, business principles, and leadership. This major is designed for students interested in starting businesses, banking and lending, real estate, public policy, or marketing and trading.
