- ENGL 104 requires successful completion of ENGL 103 (ENLG 1301) at some institutions. ENGL 103 will also go into Work Not Applied
- HIST 226 (HIST 2301) can be taken as one of the HIST courses.
- College Algebra cannot be used as elective as all General Electives in LAND must be upper level. It would go into Work Not Applied.

IMPORTANT: Landscape Architecture consists of 4 years of sequential studio courses that are not offered in the summer, nor can you double up on them. The sequence begins in a fall semester; therefore, a LAND student will graduate no earlier than 4 years after their first fall at Texas A&M. For instance, if a student begins the studio sequence in Fall 2023, they will not graduate any earlier than Spring 2027, regardless of how many hours they transfer or how many hours they take in the summers. Students will have 4 additional years when they transfer to Texas A&M.



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Coursework Timeline

- Competitive applicants will have the Required coursework completed by the application deadline.
- Applicants to the summer/fall term may be asked to submit spring final grades, this is not a guarantee.
- Summer coursework **will not** be considered for summer/fall applicants.
- Fall coursework will not be considered for spring applicants.
- Applicants to the spring term should have the Required coursework completed by the end of Summer II semester before applying.

Additional Transfer Requirements

- The Department of Landscape Architecture and Urban Planning is looking for students who are interested in pursuing our degree as a focus. Students should indicate our department as the primary major they are interested in if they wish to be admitted. The essay and supporting materials should reflect that the student is interested in pursuing our degree.
- Meeting minimum requirements does not guarantee admission. The entire record is reviewed for consistency in coursework and grades.

Additional Information

- Applicants should be serious about earning a degree in Landscape Architecture.
- Transfer applicants are instructed NOT to accept transfer admission to any major with the expectation of later applying for an on-campus change of major.

Career & Educational Opportunities

Landscape architects create useful and attractive outdoor environments. They use natural elements such as land, trees, and shrubs, to create attractive settings for buildings, highways, and parks. Landscape architectural project types include residential communities, private gardens, urban designs, college campuses, park facilities, regional landscape planning, etc. Graduates from the Bachelor of Landscape Architecture (BLA) program are prepared for employment with private practice firms in landscape architecture, engineering, architecture, or planning; and with federal, state, or local government agencies. Upon graduation students are qualified to pursue licensure in the profession or post graduate education in landscape architecture or a related field.
