IMPORTANT: Urban Planning major coursework will take a minimum of 3 years to complete beginning with a fall semester.

Coursework Timeline

- Competitive applicants will have the Required coursework completed by the application deadline.
- Applicants to the summer/fall term **will be** asked to submit spring final grades before a decision is made.
- Summer coursework **will not** be considered for summer/fall applicants.
- No spring applicants.

Additional Transfer Requirements

- Urban and Regional Planning Coursework is sequential and begins in the Fall semester. The program will take students either 3 or 4 years from their first Fall semester to complete.
- The Department of Landscape Architecture and Urban Planning is looking for students who are interested in pursuing our degree as a focus. Students should indicate Urban Planning as their first choice major if they wish priority admission. The essay and supporting materials should reflect that the student is interested in and has some knowledge of what is involved in Urban Planning.
- Meeting minimum requirements **does not** guarantee admission. The entire record is reviewed for consistency in coursework and grades. Preferred GPA is 3.00.

Additional Information

- Transfer applicants are instructed **NOT** to accept transfer admission to Urban Planning with the expectation of later applying for an on-campus change of major.

Career & Educational Opportunities

Students in this major develop plans for the use of land and the growth and revitalization of communities and regions. Urban and regional planning explores the social, economic, cultural, and natural forces that govern how communities are shaped. The Urban and Regional Planning program equips students for entry-level positions in planning allied fields and prepares them for graduate studies in fields such as Urban Planning and Land Development. The curriculum is designed to equip students with knowledge and skills to deal effectively with the



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opportunities and

challenges inherent in the development, growth and culture of neighborhoods, cities, and regions, and is based on theoretical training in the natural, physical, and social sciences. Students acquire skills that enable them to apply these theories to develop communities, cities, and regions which are safe, healthy, and sustainable.
