This transfer course sheet is applicable for applicants applying between August 1st, 2024 and October 15th, 2025.

***Foreign Language completion requirements:**

- 24-33 hours, completed at least 1 semester of beginner foreign language
- 30-45 hours, completed 1st year (2 semesters) of beginner foreign language at the college level
- 46-60 hours, completed 3rd semester (intermediate college level) of foreign language and working on 4th semester
- 61 hours, completed all beginner and intermediate foreign language courses (4 semesters) at the college level
- Applicants over 45 hours without the first year of the foreign language completed will not be considered for admission
- Students may have to complete ENGL 1301 at their institution before taking ENGL 1302.
- ENGL 1301 is a transferable course but will not satisfy the Communication requirements in this degree plan.
- The Department of Global Languages & Cultures will accept AP/IB credit when applicable. **DO NOT** retake classes for which you have AP/IB credit

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Coursework Timeline

- Competitive applicants will have the Required coursework completed by the application deadline.
- Applicants to the summer/fall term **may be** asked to submit spring final grades, this is not a guarantee.
- Summer coursework **will not** be considered for summer/fall applicants.
- Fall coursework **will not** be considered for spring applicants.
- Applicants to the spring term should have the Required coursework completed by the end of Summer II semester before applying.

Additional Transfer Requirements

- Transfer applicants should have completed a full semester (spring or fall) course load of 12 transferable hours (minimum) after graduating from high school.
- The Department of Global Languages and Cultures is looking for students who are interested in pursuing our degree as a focus. Students should indicate our department as the primary major they are interested in if they wish to be admitted. The essay and supporting materials should reflect that the student is interested in pursuing our degree.
- Meeting minimum requirements **does not** guarantee admission. The entire record is reviewed for consistency in coursework and grades.
- Maximum credit hours listed are hours completed at the time of application. All courses completed, regardless of degree applicability, are considered including transcribed credit by exam hours.
- Applicants cannot select which hours are transferable, or opt to exclude completed hours, and all hours will be factored when calculating maximum transferable hours.

Additional Information

- Please indicate in your essay which track you are considering (Literature and Language OR Classical Civilization). If interested in completing **Literature and Language** track, applicants must have at least 2 semesters of Latin or Greek. Other languages do not satisfy degree requirements for this track.
- Applicants should be serious about earning a degree in Classics.
- Transfer applicants are instructed **NOT** to accept transfer admission to any major with the expectation of later applying for an on-campus change of major.

Career & Educational Opportunities

The B.A. in Classics is designed to give students a thorough grounding in the culture, history, literature, and intellectual accomplishments of Ancient Greece and Rome from the Bronze Age to the dawn of the Middle Ages. Studying the history and literature of these civilizations will not only help students to develop skills in close reading, writing, and critical thinking, but will also help them to see how fundamental concepts of Western Civilization such as rationalism and democracy first arose in Classical Antiquity.

The Classics degree is divided into two tracks: the **Literature and Language track** has a traditional focus on Latin and Greek philology (students choose either Latin or Greek to specialize in) and is intended to enable students to read and enjoy the great texts of Classical Antiquity (Homer, Herodotus, Thucydides, Livy, Tacitus, the New Testament, etc.) in the original languages. The **Classical Civilization track** focuses instead on the history, beliefs, and material culture of ancient Greek and Roman civilization. A major in Classics signals a commitment to serious intellectual inquiry and is an excellent basis for careers in law, business, consulting, public service, and teaching. Those intending to pursue careers in medicine or finance will also find that a major in Classics can be easily combined with undergraduate courses required for those fields.
